

While a member of the Yukon Territorial Council Shaw got the first money for the Pioneer Home in Dawson; it's called the Sunset Home. He managed to squeeze \$50,000 to begin the project. Fourteen by 14 ft. rooms. Guests could cook in central kitchen. Later he managed to get an additional \$650,000 for hospital and living addition.

He also worked for road building in the Yukon. Talks about road north toward Dempster and Ft. McPherson. Federal government supplies money to build and territory shares in maintenance. To Whitehorse from Dawson: 340 miles. Talks about federal government's policy of helping industry build roads to development areas. Anvil mines in 1973 were producing about 1,000 tons of zinc and lead concentrate per day. Three hundred to 350 tons of asbestos from the Cassiar mine north of Dawson (Clinton Creek operation); United Keno Hill is producing 75 to 80 tons of silver ore daily, according to Shaw's estimates.

Talks about historic site preservation program in Dawson. Shaw has his own museum in his yard. Klondike Visitors Association began collecting antiques and built museum which since burned to the ground. Started in again. Re-built Palace Grand Theatre with the help of federal restoration dollars. After museum fire Shaw, Roy Minter, Mac Monroe, Irie Warner of Whitehorse began collecting again. KVA bought old buildings and donated to the historic site program. A \$10 to \$15 million program is underway in Dawson now.
